Rules - Old Collegians Rugby Club, Cricket Club.

1. The taking of strong drink during play is forbidden. The getting of it is not.
2. The throwing of empty bottles whilst play is taking place is strictly forbidden. The throwing of full ones is ridiculous.
3. Batsmen may be carried from, but not onto, the field of play.
4. No bowler may bowl from a prone position, even though umpires may be seen to assume this position during later stages of play.
5. Advertising on or around the pitch is forbidden except for discreet labels on bottles bearing words such as Southwark of Cooper.
6. When a batsman decides not to run, he should decline with the words "stay" or "no" and not "what the bloody hell" are you doing down this end of the pitch.
7. Contrary to some beliefs the winning side is that which scores the highest number of runs and not that side which has the greatest number of players still on their feet when stumps are drawn.
8. Stumps may be drawn at 5.30 p.m. but not Old Collegians. Neither may they be hung nor quartered.
9. In the event of rain, gumboots may be worn by batsman and bowlers only. Umpires should not be umbrellas to the stumps or prostrated fielders.
10. Any members of the S.A. Rugby Board seen attempting to erect goal posts or corner flags on the pitch during intervals of play should be reported to the umpires. The problems of playing round or through such posts are insurmountable.
