Old Collegians First XV kept in front throughout the match against Port Adelaide at Tregenza last weekend and scraped home by one point, with a score of 12 points to 11. Injuries and State Representation absentees necessitated the calling of reserves to make up half the team, and it is to these talented players we owe a great deal of gratitude in saving the day.

We had a favourable breeze in the first half and kept the play in Port's half for long spells in this period. Greg Coulson kicked an early penalty goal and shortly afterwards Dave Jacobs culminated a good midfield rush by two or three players, and scored a neat try under the posts. Having missed the easy conversion, Greg Coulson made amends when he landed a widish, long kick to score our second penalty goal. With a clear nine points to the credit of our team, we must have relaxed, for Port managed to hold their own from then until the end of the game. They scored a converted try and a penalty goal and it was not until well into the second half that Collegians added any further points. This was when David Stuart joined the attack and dived in the corner for our second try. Port kept within winning range through another penalty goal, but we held them off and maintained our one point lead, despite a number of anxious moments towards the end of the match.

Whenever Collegians handled cleanly, the backline looked most impressive. David Jacobs and Tony Maxwell were our main means of penetration and both played well. Guy Clues impressed with some fine running and good handling, as well as bringing off some effective tackles. Andrew Davidson played much better in this match than against North Adelaide. Collegians tackling and general defence was patchy and was our main weakness. Only Ports inexperience in attacking moves saved us from looking rather ragged. Play by the forwards was tame, with not nearly enough pressure exerted against weak opposition. Best of the pack were Iain Edwards, noted for constructive play, Greg Jacobs for some good tackles at times and Jim Press and Mick Guerin.
